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Dr Jean Bou

Jean Bou is a historian of war and a member of the Strategic and Defence Studies Centre at the Australian National University where his duties include teaching at the Australian Command at Staff College. He gained his PhD from the University of New South Wales (at the Australian Defence Force Academy) in 2005 and his doctoral thesis was published in 2009 by Cambridge University Press as *Light horse: a history of Australia's mounted arm*. The work he did for this forms the basis for his speaking at this event about artillery use in the Desert Mounted Corps in 1917.

Jean has also been involved in the Official History of Australian Peacekeeping, Humanitarian and Post-Cold War Operations since 2007. Having started as a research assistant he is now the lead author for volume IV of the series, which examines Australia's missions of the 1990s in Africa and the Americas (including Somalia and Rwanda). This book, *The Limits of Peacekeeping*, will be published in early 2018.

The speaker is the author, editor, co-author or co-editor of ten books on Australian military history, with 2016's *The AIF in Battle* (Melbourne University Press) and the *Australian Imperial Force* (with Peter Dennis, Cambridge University Press) being the most recent. Among his others are the *Oxford Companion to Australian Military History* (2nd edition), *Duty First: A History of the Royal Australian Regiment* (2nd edition) and *Australia's Palestine Campaign*.
