CALENDAR & TRANSPORT WOES

For the first time in years both timing and transport problems have taken a toll on attendance at several of our functions.

There comes a time when time and place just won't match up conveniently for busy people. This year was one of those times - in several instances, in fact.. Venues became unavailable, transport became unavailable and people were unavailable. Is it that we were disorganised - or is it that we have a lot more to do and fewer people to do it with ?

Perhaps it was a random combination that came together – like the perfect storm - to thwart us and show that to achieve a positive result we really have to put in some huge strides at times to make our Association work. It doesn't just happen!

First it was on – then it was off – then it was on again.

Transport availability is always an issue that needs to be resolved when older Northern members desire to travel any distance to attend a reunion or a memorial service - particularly **El Alamein Day**.- which has special significance to all Tasmanian Artillerymen.

This remembrance service and the gathering of old gunners is traditionally held in the state capital, Hobart, on the actual anniversary of the famous battle - whenever possible - October 23rd.

This year, the Royal Hobart Show People's Day clashed with our event and took precedence. The Show period extended from Thursday 23rd. until Saturday 25th.

Of necessity, the Association, the other Gunner groups and individuals, then had to take the only day option available to mark our Service of Remembrance at the Hobart Cenotaph - that being, Wednesday 22nd. October 2008.

Unfortunately, the small bus usually provided for the old gunners and carers who reside in Launceston, 123 miles away, was unavailable for the revised date and some of our members opted to make other arrangements to get there privately – if possible. However, that option was not available to all – and apologies were received from those who would find the trip out of the question - except by bus.

An effort to obtain transport, resulted in commercial cost estimates – which were not within the Association's budget capabilities to meet. – and certainly they would have been an unacceptable impost – even by sharing the cost - on many of our members who are now making-do, as most elderly people are, in this financially uncertain era.

At virtually the *'last moment'* - through the blood, sweat and tears of John Wise, Norm Andrews and others - a small bus did become available and those Northern members, who hadn't opted out and committed themselves to other plans, had the means to make their trip to Hobart after all.

Unfortunately, contacting everyone who may have preferred to have taken the bus ride, even at such short notice, was difficult and a few of us missed out.

The following brief report and photo is courtesy of our R.A.A.A.T. Secretary **Norman Andrews OAM.**, who was fortunate and made the trip.

"A smaller than usual group travelled to Hobart by bus departing at 0730hrs and arriving at about 1030hrs after a refreshment stop on the way.

Mount Wellington had an excellent snow cover well down into the foothills; and the wind was chilly coming up the bay direct from Antarctica

Our group from Launceston supplied two flag marshals for the cenotaph in Harold Mullins and Charles Tee with Rick Wood laying the wreath in Artillery colours and the HAMST 25 Pdr firing two single rounds at the appropriate time during the short service which was attended by the general public and veterans of the 9th Div who took part in the battle of El Alamein some 66 years ago.

The group then adjourned to the Waratah Hotel for a series of toasts and a counter meal, where the members mixed in well with the Veterans partners and/or carers and HAMST. Reminisces of the Battle and 2/8th Fd Regts part in the campaign were again part of the table discussions..

We, as a group, were back in Launceston just after 1700hrs having had a pleasant day. The members of the group all expressed the desire to do it all again next year on Friday the 23rd Oct 2009."
