

A Message From the Director



Dear Fellow Gunners,

1991 has again been a busy year for the Regiment and with Exercise Kangaroo 92 in March this year, 1992 is looming large already. The Directorate has been particularly busy with the Force Structure Review and aspects flowing from it.

1st Field Regiment begins conversion to Ready Reserve in mid-1992. Ready Reservists will be recruited from South Queensland, attend Recruit Training at Kapooka, Initial Employment Training at the School of Artillery and arrive at Enoggera by July 1992. 16th Air Defence Regiment also receive their first Ready Reservists, a smaller number, by July 1992.

A new initiative, whereby the cadre of an ARes unit is increased to examine the effect on unit readiness, is to be conducted in 23rd Field Regiment from February 1992. The cadre will be doubled in size with two more officers, one to each field battery, SGTs Gun No, OP CP (Fd), Sig Arty, Drivers, Clerks, Fitter Armament and Medical Assistant to be posted in before the annual camp in May 1992. 23rd Field Regiment will be assessed on ARTEP in 1993 to examine the success of the initiative.

Although I advised in the mid year Newsletter that Headquarters of 6/13 Field Regiment would be raised in Adelaide, due to other competing priorities for manpower, it has not been possible to proceed with that project. 16th Field Battery and 48th Field Battery are likely to remain independent for some time.

The Master Gunner St James's Park, General Sir Martin Farndale KBE, visited Australia in November and opened the Regimental Conference on 7 November. The Master Gunner spoke of his role in the Regiment, changes in the Royal Artillery, the status of the Royal Regiment throughout Commonwealth and the Royal Artillery Heritage Project, which is to be developed near Stonehenge over the next decade. In his address he said that although he had never been to North Head before, he felt completely at home on arrival because of the many Australian Gunners he had served with and the closeness of the relationship between the Regiments. A plaque at the entrance to the Regimental Officers Mess marks his visit.

The RAA Regimental Committee met in November with the main issue for discussion the writing of the History of the RAA. The Committee decided to invite Lieutenant Colonel David Horner (Retd) to write a one volume history of the Regiment from its formation in 1899 but also including a section on the pre Federation period. I will be discussing details with the author who hopes to commence the task by July this

year with a view to releasing the book by December 1994. This is a major undertaking and I will be writing to units, members and Associations in 1992 giving further details and seeking your support for this very important project. Lieutenant Colonel Horner will be visiting the RAA Museum, and meeting members of the RAAHS in February of this year.

The Regimental Committee acknowledged the achievements of Major General John Stevenson as Colonel Commandant in 3MD since 1988 and as Representative Colonel Commandant since 1989. He leaves both appointments on 13 March 1992. On behalf of the Regiment I wish to express my thanks to Major General Stevenson for his total involvement throughout the tenure of his appointment and his wise counsel which so many Gunners have valued.

Major General Rodney Fay, Colonel Commandant in 2MD becomes Representative Colonel Commandant on 14 March 1992 and Major General Jim Barry, becomes Colonel Commandant 3MD on the same day.

I offer my congratulations to the four Gunners who received awards in the Australia Honours List. Brigadier Ian MacInnes, AM, now Chief of Staff Land Headquarters, Brigadier Jim Ryan, AM, Chief of Staff Logistic Command, Warrant Officer Class One Kevin Browning, OAM, Regimental Master Gunner and Warrant Officer Class Two Peter Muir, OAM, BSM 28th Field Battery.

On the RAA Museum front, a Development Plan has been produced allocating priorities for the next five years. In other recent developments, the Hornsby Engines have been installed on the Engine Room courtesy of the Royal Australian Navy, 10 Terminal Regt, 4th Field Regiment and DARTY-A staff; and the No 4 Mark 7 Radar has been renovated and is now open for inspection. Whenever in Sydney, ensure you visit the Museum.

In December 1991 there were few changes in the RAA hierarchy with only CO and RSM 4th Field Regiment, the Career Adviser SCMA, SO1 Arty and Master Gunner at Land Command and RSM 7th Field Regiment moving on. I thank them for their support over the two years and offer my best wishes in their new appointments.

To all members of the Regiment, especially those serving overseas, I offer my best wishes for 1992.

Headquarters 1ST Division Artillery

- 1. 1991 was a busy year for the staff of HQ 1 Div Arty due to staffing and exercise planning commitments. Major artillery exercises included EX IRON GAUNTLET designed to practise staff procedures at the FSCC and EX TASMAN LINK with 4 Fd Regt to practise joint fire support coordination in support of a Bde attack. There was also a very useful seminar in May.
- 2. Other commitments included the conduct of EX OVERLORD for the staff of HQ 1 Div, the Open day at Fort Lytton and an army exhibition at the RNA Brisbane Show.
- 3. The ARTEPs proved again to be a useful method of assessing the units of 1 Div Arty. The battalion COs set the fire plans for the BCs during these exercises. Similarly, during EX TASMAN LINK the Commander and battalion COs of 3 Bde set the fire plans for the 4 Fd Regt CO and BCs.
- 4. The staff of HQ 1 Div Arty has been reduced by 60% as a result of the FSR. The staff workload will increase and the administrative support for the HQ will now be provided by 131 Div Loc Bty.
- 5. 1992 will provide similar challenges to last year with the addition of EX TOP SHELF. This is a CPX for the FSCC to be conducted in Brisbane. EX IRON GAUNTLET will be conducted in New Zealand at Whangaparaoa.

1 FIELD REGIMENT

- 1. Reflecting back on 1991 places a knowing smile on the faces of those who were with the 'Premier Regiment'. For whilst the year was unremarkable in terms of major exercises or overseas deployments it was noteworthy for the high standard of training achieved. It also became obvious that strong battery and regimental spirit would overcome manning deficiencies and become a 'force multiplier', which it did.
- 2. The Regiment embarked on an ambitious set of objectives early in the year. The more tangible results of this were:
- a. completing Blackhawk deployment training during Exercise Nadzab Hamel and refining standard loads;
- b. employing modified safety at the gun line;
- c. digging in a danger close OP at Shoalwater Bay and bringing rounds to within 170 metres;
- d. constructing two fire support bases with 7 Fd Sqn, FSB Beverley and Mary-Anne, the former of which stands as a permanent tribute to our toils;
- e. conducting adventurous training including a survival exercise over seven days and white water rafting on the Nymboida River, which 104 Fd Bty organised:
- f. the presentation to 105 Fd Bty of the US Meritorious Unit Commendation for the Battery's service as part of the 1 RAR group in South Vietnam 1965-66;
- g. three soldiers deployed on OP MINURSO to the Western Sahara;
- h. sponsoring the Gunner Dinner and hosting a tribal elders dinner comprising former COs of the Regt as guests;
- i. participating in all sports and making the grand finals in most cases; and
- defeating 131 Div Loc Bty in a very fairly judged 'Anything Goes' Competition.
- 3. The low point of the year was Gunner Lane's tragic death in a road accident. Gunner Lane was a fine young soldier and a proud member of the Regiment. He is missed by us all.
- 4. All in all 1991 was a most successful year for the Regiment. We met the majority of our objectives, regardless of the numerous tasks thrust upon us at short notice or limitations such as reduced manning. Our results proved that where there's a will, there's a way.

2/10 MEDIUM REGIMENT

- 1. 2/10 Medium Regiment was raised on the 31 March 91 and the Unit now consists of RHQ and HQ Battery (including TST and Band) with depots located at Batman Ave. Melbourne, 22 Field Battery with Depots located at Dandenong and Baxter on the Mornington Peninsula, and 38 Medium Battery with depots located at Geelong and Colac on the other side of Port Phillip Bay. A significant percentage of TST is also located at Geelong.
- 2. 1991 has been both a demanding and rewarding year. The Regiment conducted three major exercises, two of which were assessment by CLCA originally scheduled for 2/15 Field Regiment and 10 Medium Regiment and the third being the 4 Bde concentration and AFX.
- The first major exercise was conducted by elements of RHQ, HQ Battery and 22 3. 22 Field Battery was formed as a preliminary move prior to unit amalgamation, by the amalgamation of 2 and 23 Field Batteries into one gun battery on the 23 Feb 91. The exercise was conducted over the period 9-18 Mar 91 at Puckapunyal and was the first of two one week camps originally to be trialled by 2/15 Field Regiment in 1991. The exercise culminated in a CLCA assessment. For the assessment, 22 Field Battery fielded six fully manned guns and two undermanned FO parties. 22 Field Battery performed well in the ARTEP and was regarded by the assessment team as at the forefront of GRes batteries. It was subsequently placed second in the Mount Shank Trophy. This was a particularly good result when taking into account the short period between amalgamation and assessment. One of the highlights of the exercise, including the assessment phase, was the use made of supported arms officers in the setting of fire plans and general fire missions. 1st Armoured Regiment provided the support for this initiative. This training proved to be extremely effective for both the supported arms commander and the FO as it exposed all concerned to the application of fire rather than just single target engagement.
- 4. The second major exercise was conducted by elements of RHQ, HQ Battery and 38 Medium Battery which was formed by the amalgamation of the sub units of 10 Medium Regiment late in 1990. The exercise was conducted over the period 4-18 May 91 at Puckapunyal and culminated in a CLCA assessment originally intended for 10 Medium Regiment. For the assessment, 38 Medium Battery fielded three fully manned guns and one fully manned FO party. Two detachments and some specialists from 103 Medium Battery were attached during the first week and much benefit was gained. The Battery achieved above average results and again this was an outstanding results. In particular, the technical proficiency of the Command Post was acknowledged. Effective use was also made of officers from 5/6 RVR in the setting of fire plans and general fire missions throughout the exercise and assessment.

- 5. The third major exercise was conducted by the Regiment over the period 31 Aug 6 Sep 91 at Puckapunyal as part of the 4 Bde concentration and AFX. The exercise was also the second of two one week camps being trialled. The highlight of the exercise was the preparation and occupation of a defensive gun position using Engineer resources from 4 Bde. The exercise proved that the unit can operate in limited regimental and defensive environments within a Brigade setting. 38 Medium Battery was only in the field for the first weekend as the Geelong and Colac personnel were not able to meet the nine day commitment at that stage.
- 6. In addition to the three major exercises, elements of the unit participated and performed creditably in a number of Div and Bde directed activities. These included the following:
- a. Ex NORTHERN NOMAD (squad patrolling activity for junior ranks in Northern Australia);
- b. Div and Bde TEWTS;
- c. Div and Bde CPXs; and
- d. Div and Bde Military Skills Competitions.
- 7. The 3 Div RAA Band also remains part of the unit establishment and continued its high professional musical standards during the year. A total of 18 military and five civilian engagements were undertaken with the highlight being several circuits in the Melbourne ANZAC Day March.
- 8. 1991 has proved to be a successful inaugural year for 2/10 Medium Regiment. Solid performances throughout the year and particularly good assessment exercises have provided the foundation for the further development of Unit skills.

4 FIELD REGIMENT

- 1. 1991 was a year of great variety for the Regiment. During the course of the year soldiers were involved in exercises which saw them not only travel to the traditional training areas but also to Malaysia and New Zealand.
- 2. The training year provided many challenges for all elements of the Regiment. After conducting Battery exercises the Regiment deployed to Shoalwater Bay on Exercise Tasman Link. This exercise was a tri-service exercise and proved to be an ideal opportunity for the Regiment to practise joint operations. Tasman Link proved quite a challenge with the Regiment providing not only the fire support but also the logistic support to the many units involved.
- 3. Another highlight of the training year was the support of the Battalion field firing exercises provided by the gun batteries. The fire support provided, particularly during the attack and defence, once again demonstrated the capabilities and effects of artillery fire.
- 4. As a lead up to the CDA's Assessment exercise the Regiment deployed on Exercise Max Ord. The Regiment conducted a variety of activities including fire and movement, direct firing, defence of the gun position and a number of other skills.
- 5. From 3-10 May the Regiment was privileged to host the 4 Field Regiment South Vietnam Veterans Association reunion. The reunion week was planned to coincide with the Regiment's 31st birthday celebrations and included such activities as a live firing exercise at High Range Training Area, a trip to Magnetic Island, a reunion luncheon and a reunion dinner at the Sheraton. The week was a great success with the veterans sharing many a story with the members of the Regiment.
- 6. During the latter part of the year the Regiment hosted 40 Malaysian soldiers from the 21st Royal Malaysian Regiment as part of Exercise Suman Warrior 91. The two week exercise provided not only a chance to exchange military procedures but also to exchange different cultures.
- 7. The Regiment had a very good year on the sporting field. It began well with the Regiment winning the Brigade water polo competition and continued throughout the winter sports competition. The soccer team improved dramatically during the year and lost a very close Grand Final to 1 RAR in a penalty shoot out.
- 8. In summary 1991 was a very busy year which contained many opportunities for challenging training in a variety of training areas. The year had many highlights as can be seen from the various activities conducted and the Regiment looks forward to 1992 and in particular the challenges that Exercise Kangaroo 92 holds in store.

5/11 FIELD REGIMENT

- 1. 5/11 Fd Regt has had an interesting and active 1991. The highlight of the year was the arrival of the new Hamel guns into the Regiment and the Courses Camp that proceeded it.
- 2. The year began, however, with the Regiment conducting an IET course for Gunners and Signallers in February. This was followed by a dry deployment ex $Brush\ Up$ when the three gun batteries and HQ Bty practised their deployment in their local training areas. Although the training was worthwhile, the training areas had their limitations. Not so the LFX, in April, when the whole Regiment converged, en masse, to Wide Bay Training Area. The aims of the exercise were met, although the five months break from the last LFX meant many lessons had to be re-learnt.
- 3. The Regiment was next involved in Ex 'Iron Gauntlet where we teamed up with 16 Fd Regt (NZ) to form the fourth Regiment under command HQ 1 Div Arty. It was good working with the Kiwis and we are looking forward to operating with them next year.
- 4. The Regiment Small Arms weekend saw about 200 members practise their weapon handling and marksmanship. Some did better than others, but all agreed that more practice was needed.
- 5. Saturday 6 July saw the first of the year's L5 gun races during the Fort Lytton Open Day. Although the Regiments team was first across the line, 1 Fd Regt took the race on a technicality and won convincingly on the second race, giving them the Fort Lytton Trophy. Well done, 1 Fd Regt!
- 6. The Regiment's LFX Big Pelagun again saw all three gun Batteries and HQ Bty deploy to the field. Many of the problems that occurred in the first LFX had been sorted out and the exercise saw a great success. It was also the last firing by the Regiment of the L5.
- 7. August saw the Regiment conduct a Courses Camp but not before it won the third and final L5 gun race, beating 1 Fd Regt during the Brisbane Show. During the Courses Camp the unit conducted 8 IET and Subj 4 for Bdr courses, as well as a Hamel Conversion Course (the latter with the assistance of the Master Gunner and his team from the School). 156 students attended courses for drivers, OPCP Fd, Guns Sigs. It was the first time the Subj 4 Bdr Sigs course had been run and it was deemed, by all, to be a good course.
- 8. The whole camp was a success which could not have occurred without the support of 1 Fd Regt, 8/12 Mdm Regt, the School and 131 Div Loc Bty. Of all these, 1 Fd Regt must take the greatest credit, not only for the material support, but also for the instructor support. Thank you, Gunners!
- 9. October was a highlight, due to the arrival of 6 of our new Hamel guns, although the Q staff had to work overtime. October was also the month that 13 Fd Bty won the 11 Bde Military Skills Competition and minor units trophy and really upsetting the infantry by winning the falling plate competition.

- 10. The LFX in November was the first time we used the new guns, with 14 and 41 Fd Btys doing some indirect firing as well as testing the accuracy of the new guns during a direct fire practice.
 - 11. The year has ended with 13 Fd Bty conducting an LFX at Shoalwater Bay Training Area with 42 RQR. The shooting went well until rain and cloud dampened firing. It is a long way to drive just for a swim.
 - 12. In addition to all these activities, officers of the Regiment have attended TEWTs in Weipa at the mine site with part of 7 Bde LLO. Five officers have also successfully completed their RCSC this year.
 - 13. The Regiment has also continued to support the Cadets, with the additional adoption of 127 RCU at Ipswich adding to HQ Bty's support to 10 RCU. Both units now wear the white lanyard.
 - 14. Local community support has also been high on the list of tasks this year, including support to the Pine Rivers Show, the Royal Brisbane Show, The Limelight Festival at Ipswich, Tropicana Festival on the Gold Coast, and the National Triatholon Competition on the Southport Broadwater.
 - 15. The Commanding Officer and all the members of the Regiment wish all Gunners a happy and successful 1992.

7 FIELD REGIMENT

- 1. 1991 was a progressive year for the Regiment under its new CO, Lieutenant Colonel John Fairless. The Regiment celebrated its 75th anniversary with a church service at the Garrison Chapel, a 'Feu De Joie' at Dawes Point, followed by a celebratory lunch at the School of Artillery.
- 2. Another highlight of 1991 was the joint service, multinational firing weekend, at Beecroft, in September. The Regiment, using two six-gun batteries joined with the RNZAF A4 Skyhawks for a fire planning exercise. 7 Field Regiment was as proficient with its small arms as it was with its howitzers. At the Australian Army Skill at Arms Meeting it scooped the pool winning six team trophies including the SLR Championship, the Open Unit Championship and the Team Snap. Individuals won Junior Champion and Best Target Rifle Shooter. The Regiment also won the Canberra Tri-Service Teams Championship, the Australian Minor Units Championship and accredited itself well in the 2nd Division Military Skills Competition.
- 3. 1992 will be another significant year in the Regiment's history as the venerable M2A2 Howitzer is replaced by the Hamel Gun. We will be busy later this year converting onto the Hamel and then improving our standard of collective training. This training will culminate at the AFX where an Artep is to be conducted. The camp will be conducted at Puckapunyal Range, a new experience for most of the Regiment. Hopefully time will be available to view the Armoured Regiment and see how our tracked comrades-in-arms work.
- 4. All in all the Regiment is enjoying a very successful period, manned to it's authorised level it is conducting interesting, varied and valuable training. The Regiment extends it's congratulations to WO2 P.D. Muir for receipt of his OAM in the Australia Day's honours list.

The future of Artillery is looking good at 7 Field Regiment.

8TH/12TH MEDIUM REGIMENT

- 1. The Regiment commenced the year with "School of Artillery" shoots and salutes, although there was an unexpected call out to assist with storm damage in the northern suburbs of Sydney. The new Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel J.R. Cox made his mark early in the year with Exercise SNAIL'S PACE which was an arduous 20 kilometre manhandling exercise. With temperatures reaching the "40s" making for an exacting two days on Holsworthy Range, the next Regimental exercise at Singleton (Exercise BRUSH UP) was comparatively pleasant.
- 2. The inter battery sports competitions were fiercely contested with the swimming carnival setting the pace the result being a draw between A Field Battery and 103 Medium Battery. The majority of the remaining sports competitions were won by A Field Battery, resulting in the battery being awarded the Soudan Shield.
- 3. In April the Regiment made it's annual pilgrimage to Puckapunyal for the Exercise EL ALAMEIN firepower demonstration. Despite freezing weather, the Regiment put on an impressive performance, the highlight being a Regiment mission with white phosphorous fused with airburst.
- 4. The Regiment found itself back at Puckapunyal in May for Exercise GOULBURN THUNDER to sharpen unit skills. The exercise provided the first opportunity for 103 Medium Battery to fire HERA in 1991 and the first time for the Regiment to fire Abbot ammunition with two L118 barrels being calibrated. The exercise also involved combined arms training with the CO 1st Armoured Regiment setting a fire plan for BC 103 Medium *Battery, Major P.R. Maw.
 - 5. The month of June saw A Field Battery join 4th Field Regiment in Shoalwater Bay for Exercise TASMAN LINK. A very busy and interesting exercise for the BC Major G.P. Jones and the FO parties, it was a little less arduous for the gun line who even managed a little swimming and fishing off Clinton Peninsula.
 - 6. The Regiment provided some unusual support to Army Recruiting on Exercise BLUE GUNNER at "Australia's Highest Concert". In conjunction with the RMC Band, a composite battery from the Regiment fired an 1812 Overture at the Mount Blue Cow Ski resort. This also provided the opportunity for some adventurous training at the resort, although some though the setting up and pulling down of the campsite in blizzard conditions was adventurous enough!
 - 7. The Regiment had a number of major sporting successes during the year including the winning of the Brigade cross country. The rugby team emerged as joint premiers with 5/7 RAR in the 2MD competition after a very hard year. The Regiment had a very successful year with its tug-o-war team, mostly made up of members from TST. The team won the Brigade competition and the 2MD inter-service competition.
 - 8. Throughout the year the whole regiment deployed at Holsworthy range for two exercises known as ON GUARD. These exercises aimed to test preparedness and keep skills sharp, while making the best use of scarce resources.

- 9. The culmination of the years training was Exercise TOP SHELF at Singleton, which involved a Regimental exercise and the CDA's assessment. Both phases were demanding and improved the Regiment's proficiency and preparedness.
- 10. Not all the unit's training was conducted at the usual training areas. The Regiment was involved with three overseas trips, Exercise TROPIC LIGHTNING (Hawaii), LONG LOOK (UK) and a section group went to Malaysia with 3 RAR for a three month tour.
- 11. A Field Battery continued to develop it's parachute capability with a very successful drop of three Hamel guns on Exercise PARA FROG. Fortunately none of the battery members who parachuted with the A/BC Captain P.J. Murphy on Exercise CANOPY TUTOR at Nowra in November were among the 38 injured. The battery parachuted 19 personnel in for the exercise and air landed a further 28 who could not jump because of high winds on the second day of the exercise. Overall 1991 has seen a substantial development of A Field Battery's integration into the Airborne Force and it is anticipated this will continue in 1992.
- 12. The end of the year did not draw to a close quietly with a large number of "School of Artillery" supports and salutes, (including that for President George Bush). A Field Battery won all the major trophies including $2^{nd}/1^{st}$ Medium Regiment Trophy, the Trobuch Trophy and the Coral Trophy.
- 13. The final unit parade saw the departure of Major R.M. Baguley, Major G.P. Jones and Major P.D. Winter, and the promotions of Major N.R. Littlewood, Major R.M. Manton and Warrant Officer Class One S.L. Booth.
 - 8/12 Medium Regiment wishes all Regiments and units the best for 1992.

16TH AIR DEFENCE REGIMENT

- 1. 1991 was a very successful year for 16 AD Regiment. The year incorporated both operational service and a host of training activities. At the start of 1991 the Regiment underwent major personnel changes and saw the introduction of ICLCE. The following courses were conducted throughout the year:
- a. Subject 4 Bombardier (missile number) course;
- b. limited licence drivers course;
- c. ECN 109-1 unrestricted drivers course; and
- d. GRes IET course.
- 2. The Regiment welcomed the safe return of the soldiers who served with the RAN during the Gulf conflict. After their return the Commanding Officer, Lt Col K.R. Cross presented the Australian Active Service Medal and the Australian Service Medal to those personnel who served in the conflict.
- 3. At the completion of operational activities the Regiment maintained an association with the RAN for the remainder of 1991. An RBS-70 detachment was respectively deployed with HMAS Swan and HMAS Derwent. Both ships were deployed to South East Asian waters. A notable activity during HMAS Derwent's deployment was a successful RBS-70 live-firing from the ship.
- 4. On 4 Aug 91 the Regiment commenced deployment to Darwin by road to participate in Ex Pitch Black 91. The Rapier fire units were transported to Darwin using medium lift aircraft. Ex pitch Black 91 was a combined RAAF sponsored exercise with elements of the Singaporean Air Defence Artillery and the United States Air Force (USAF) participating along with 16 AD Regiment. The USAF assisted with the provision of EA-6B Prowler Aircraft, that enabled the detachments to work in an ECM environment. The AD was disbursed across the 'Top End' with fire units located from Port Keats to Katherine. The exercise concluded with a successful live-firing conducted at the Delamere Air Weapons Range, located approximately 180 km south of Katherine.
- 5. Ex Crab Arrow II was the other 1991 live-firing. During this exercise 110 AD Battery and 111 AD Battery (Lt) respectively fired Rapier and RBS-70 weapons at Woomera. 110 AD Battery also conducted a night firing using the DN181 Radar Tracker or *Noddy* as it is affectionately known. This exercise was also successfully completed.

- 6. The Regiment's 1991 minor activities included sub unit deployments, range practices, IMT and Adventure Training, the provision of several displays, and many sporting activities. 111 AD Battery (Lt) deployed a Troop to Malaysia for the IADS ADEX 91-2 and defended RMAF Butterworth. The regiment conducted several small arms practices at the Murray Bridge Range, and an IMT exercise was conducted in the Kuipto State Forest the Adelaide Hills being the AO. All sub-units conducted Adventure Training activities, one of the more adventurous activities being cross country snow skiing at Falls Creek. During the year the Regiment also provided displays for the Perth Show, Sydney Royal Easter Show and AIDEX 91. In regard to sport, 1991 was a physical year in which the Regiment competed against other Units and civilian organisations within the Fourth Military District.
- 7. In 1992 the Regiment anticipates another busy and successful year. The Regiment will participate in K92, Swift Eagle 92, Tasman Link 92 and continue deploying RBS-70 detachments with the RAN. Once again 16 AD Regt will make its annual pilgrimage to Darwin. It is also anticipated that the unit will provide personnel for IADS in Malaysia and Ex Long Look. 1991 was a successful year with the safe return of the members who served in the Gulf conflict and the continued benefit of combined/joint activities; 1991 was a successful year what else would we say!

23 FIELD REGIMENT

- 1. 1991 proved to be an important year for 23 Field Regiment in terms of its training and recruiting. The unit is in better shape than it was this time last year, particularly as the numbers of non-effectives have been reduced such that the manning statistics are more representative of unit capability. Numbers are increasing and better still the retention rate is improving steadily. The unit has recruited over 50 new soldiers in 1991 so learning curves all round are steep.
- 2. Training for 1991 was conducted in accordance with the Commander Divisional Artillery's (2nd Division) Training Directive which placed a heavy emphasis on improving individual skills. In March, a courses camp was conducted at Singleton with members from some other units including 7 Field Regiment in attendance. The camp provided a good opportunity for many soldiers and NCO's to be qualified in IET and promotion subjects as well as improving the technical and instructional skills of the Unit's Officers and SNCO's. The training weekends that then followed concentrated on exercising these newly acquired skills as well as providing an opportunity to improve marksmanship and individual battlecraft skills. The best 'skilled' soldiers then went on to represent the Unit at the 2nd Division Military Skills Competition with the 23 Field Regiment Team achieving commendable results.
- 3. The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the Granting of the Freedom of the Municipality of Rockdale to 23 Field Regiment on July 14. The Parade was hosted by MAJGEN Fay AO, RFD, ED, the Colonel Commandant RAA 2MD, and attended by COMD 5 BDE, BRIG McGrath, RFD. The Reviewing Officer, was The Mayor of the Municipality of Rockdale, Alderman Peter Bryant. Alderman Bryant served as a senior NCO of 18 LAA Regiment, a unit which was amalgamated with 23 Field Regiment in 1974. The parade was a great success, particularly from the PR point of view and further enhanced the Unit's strong ties to the local community.
- 4. The 23 Field Regiment Band continues to grow in both numbers and expertise. It has been well supported by the 2MD Band and its technical competence has been greatly advanced. The Band played at numerous engagements both civil and military throughout the year. The Band will continue to be busy in 1992 with many bookings already confirmed.
- 5. Of the people that left the Unit in 1991, special mention must be made of MAJ P.H. Chapman and WO2 P.J. Moore. Both men retired from the Active Ares after long and distinguished careers, and their service and dedication to the Unit will long be remembered.
- 6. 1992 is shaping up to be an exciting year for 23 Field Régiment. With the acquisition of the Hamel gun from February/March and the annual camp being conducted in Brisbane and Wide Bay Training Area in May, the year promises to be both challenging and interesting.

7 FIELD BATTERY

- 1. A number of significant milestones were achieved during 1991 toward the goal of once again having a field regiment represent the Corps in the West.
- 2. Approval was given to increase our establishment of 105mm M2A2 to eight, and the unit has been tasked by the Comd 13 Bde to provide two, four gun troops from within its current authorised manning. Our coincident submission for increased manning was not as successful, but we are not disheartened. We are presently putting together an "offer too good to refuse". It was very encouraging to note that our original submission was fully supported at formation level, and within the Corps.
- 3. Our strength continues to improve at a pleasing rate. Our current strength is 113 (establishment 137). This represents an improvement of more than 33% since our input to the 1990 Liaison Letter More than 20 sponsored applicants are being processed through the system also.
- 4. During the year the unit provided an FSCC, 2xBC parties, FO parties and Regimental CP (about 40 personnel in all) to Comd 13 Bde CPX. A significant achievement for a Battery organisation. Lt Col Dick Lawler ran the FSCC and taught all, valuable lessons while cementing the importance of the FSCC as a vital component of the Bde. The unit will be looking to provide members to participate in further CPX both in the West and elsewhere to consolidate lessons learned.
- 5. The unit participated in two combined arms shoots during the AFX this year. The first saw us join with 10 LH to undertake an Artillery/Armour cooperation shoot, and practice all arms fire control procedures. The second was the culmination of the AFX where the unit provided close fire support to two live firing platoon attacks. Armour, SFMG and Mortars were also involved.
- 6. Individually, unit members have returned some impressive course performances during the year, and this augurs well for 1992 and 1993 when we next are assessed, hopefully in conjunction with providing support to the School of Artillery.

48 FIELD BATTERY

- 1. The calendar year 1990 ended with two successful weekend activities firstly, a live firing exercise in October (which included a "bring-a-buddy" recruiting theme as well as a visit by members of the RAA Association of SA), and secondly, a navigation/small arms exercise in November.
- 2. However the level of activity dropped off in 1991 as restrictions on ARTD started to take effect. A live firing exercise planned for March was cancelled and several Tuesday night parades were converted to a voluntary unpaid basis.
- 3. The first live firing exercise of the year was conducted in June at Cultana. The attachment of 13 soldiers from 16 AD Regt (including a complete gun detachment) enabled the Battery to put 6 guns in the field, which has not happened for several years. However, the standard of Gunnery achieved by the Battery was barely adequate. There were two reasons firstly, many personnel were still in the teaching phase of ECN courses and, secondly, the gap of 8 months since the previous live firing exercise had allowed skills, at all levels, to become rusty.
- 4. In July the Battery was informed that it had won the Mt Schanck trophy as a result of the CLCA assessment at AFT'90.
- 5. The major activity for the year was the AFT conducted in Aug/Sep as part of Exercise Rhino Charge, the concentration of SA-based units of 9 Bde. The unit AFT was structured as a compressed version of post call out training at Woomera, leading to an operational deployment exercise at Cultana. Attendance was 72 GRes and 6 ARA; 23 personnel had approved leave for work and study reasons. The Battery deployed 4 guns and one FO party.
- 6. The AFT deliberately included a variety of terrain and activities and was very successful in that regard. The Woomera area was quite suitable for artillery deployments, but FO training was limited because live firing is restricted to the Lake Hart salt pan. The Cultana activities included an intensive ARTEP-like phase, but also included a night-time direct fire practice from the gun position, assisted by illumination from 10/27 RSAR mortars.

- 7. The standard of Gunner skills improved steadily throughout the AFT, and was very good on the last day. Weaknesses to be addressed in future training are signaller skills, fire planning, and FO tactics. Once again the appointment of a Director of Practice at Cultana (Major Jones, an ex-member of the Battery) allowed the BC and TO to concentrate on training and exercising the Battery.
- 8. The unit is to conduct only one further weekend activity this year a navigation/small arms exercise in November.
- 9. The next AFT will be a Brigade level exercise in March 1993. In 1992 the emphasis will be on conducting ECN courses, and only three weekend live firing exercises are planned. The Battery will also send BC and FO parties to K92 with 10/27~RSAR.
- 10. Current manning is 108 GRes personnel, including 15 recruits. There are 6 discharges in progress, and 15 enlistment applications pending. Thus a slow but steady increase in numbers can be expected in 1992. The current strength is 24 short of the 6/13 Fd Regt GRes manpower entitlement. Deficiencies are mainly drivers and signallers.
- 11. The Battery continues to perform well and is endeavouring to further develop the Gunner skills in the unit, particularly of the FO parties, in preparation for K92 and for AFT93.

131 DIVISIONAL LOCATING BATTERY

131 Divisional Locating Battery has enjoyed a busy 1991 with all the troops spending a significant period in the field. The years activities began with the annual IMT exercise. This year it was conducted outside Esk in the Deongwar State Forest area. An involved build up to the exercise began early in the New Year in an effort to make the exercise realistic and in keeping with the BC's policy of training for war and not peace. The exercise introduced low level operations and those skills required for that type of warfare. It culminated in a company attack on the defended enemy location.

In between exercises the Battery held a CFT/range weekend with the main aims including fostering of integration within the Battery and developing more realistic and constructive training for the soldiers. The period until May 18th consisted of lead-up training in preparation for the CDA's assessment and included a number of liaison visits, in particular the Defence Force Advocate, the Director of Artillery and the CDA's visits. The CDA's assessment again proved that 131 Divisional Locating Battery was capable of performing its role in battle.

The second half of the year is traditionally the support period and it is generally the busiest time of the year for the ODF troops of the Battery. This year was no exception with the troops being spread as far as Sydney and Townsville. A large contingent from the Battery's ODF elements was involved with the 6 Bde Camp which was conducted throughout October.

Despite the Bty's heavy support commitments it experienced a very successful year in sport. The Bty's teams won the premierships in Cricket, Rugby and Soccer and were runners up in the Australian Rules (Enoggera Gunners) and Touch Rugby (winter comp). The Bty also won the minor units swimming carnival and the minor units athletics carnival.

Whilst the unit has performed well in the field and in sport there have been some important administrative advances. The Auto Q and Centrespay computers were introduced into the Q Store and the HQ respectively. Two new 6x6 Perenti Landrovers were introduced as repair parts vehicles and the unit received its first batch of Khaki boots. The unit is expecting to receive the Raven, Steyr, IPS, GPS and PACs during 1992 and it will have camouflage painting on its three radars completed early in the new year.

131 Div Loc Bty has had a successful year during 1991 and has maintained a high morale and esprit de corps. As a result of the Force Structure Review on ARA manning levels throughout the Army the BTY has incurred a reduction in ARA manning but has received a boost in GRes numbers to offset this. The Battery has a long and successful future to look forward to.

School of Artillery

- 1. The School trained over 470 personnel in 1991 including students from New Zealand, Malaysia, PNG, The Philippines, Singapore and Thailand. 36 courses were conducted including mobile AAAD Instructor courses in 1, 3 and 6 BDE areas and the Army Pilots, Observation of Fire course in Townsville. We also provided instructor support to 5/11 Fd Regt's courses camp, sent a static display team to Exercise EL ALAMEIN, ran a 3 day Introduction to Artillery course for visiting students of the PNG Defence Academy and provided IGs for CDA assessment exercises.
- 2. 1991 saw the amalgamation of Gunnery and Locating Wings into Field Wing. However, this change did not affect the function of either area. On the Gunnery side, the addition of three GRes courses (WO Gny, Sgt OPCP and Sgt Gun) resulted in the Branch conducting 18 courses in 1991. The changeover of UK instructors occurred in 1991 with Major Clark and WO1 Fox marching in for duty. The introduction of Self-Paced Training for GRes courses has been successful, allowing the formal training of the School to concentrate on job-related aspects. This is the future for ARA as well as GRes courses. Locating Branch conducted six courses during the year. CPT Vanden Berg (US Army) marched in as the Radar/Artillery Intelligence instructor. BDR Churches and SGT Chambers were selected to attend Ex LONG LOOK.
- 3. Air Defence Wing had a busy year in 1991, conducting Regimental Officers Basic, Regimental Officers Advanced and Subject 4 for Sergeant Missile Number courses. The reduction in recruiting numbers limited the number of IET courses to one. During breaks between training courses an intensive period of course designing and writing saw three new TMP produced within the Wing. To add some excitement and refresh military skills, Air Defence Wing conducted an adventurous training exercise in the Grafton area during July. The activity consisted of survival training with a group of Aboriginal people from the area, gliding, and white water canoeing in the Coolang Creek and Nymboida River. The exercise was a learning experience for all, particularly in survival skills such as learning which native berries are edible and how to ride an upside down canoe through rapids.
- 4. Development Wing completed the following major doctrine projects in 1991:
- a. RAA CTN 5-13 Gun Drill L118/L119 approved, awaiting printing and distribution.
- b. RAA CTN 1-2 Artillery Intelligence Staff Duties completed, awaiting approval, printing and distribution.
- c. RAA Directive 210 Prediction of Smoke/Illum Data L5/L119.
- d. RAA Directive 212 Ammunition Batch MV Data.
- e. RAA Directive 216 Change Temperature Thermometer SI-100 Artillery.
- f. RAA Directive 217 US GFT for Projectile Illuminating 155 AMI 111 M485A2 Fused M565.
- g. Amdi List 1 to RAA CTN 3-13 Orders for Practice.
- h. Amdt List 1 to RAA CTN 3-2 Duties in Action awaiting approval and issue.

- 5. A number of other pamphlets are approaching first draft stage, and should be circulated to units for comments in early 1992. These pamphlets include:
- a. MLW Two, Arty 1.5, Planning and Control of Air Defences.
- b. RAA CTN 5-30 UHB L118/L119.
- c. RAA CTN 3-6 Weapon Locating Troop.
- d. RAA CTN 5-4 Equipment Drill AN/TPQ 36 Weapon Locating Radar.
- e. RAA CTN 4-1 AD Units Organisation and Deployment.
- f. RAA CTN 4-4 AD Units Duties in Action.
- g. RAA CTN 5-1 Director L1A2 F1/F2 cased.
- 6. RTW has had another successful year with the completion of Six IET courses and five cross trainee courses. The Wing conducted an equipment principles tour of P&EE Graytown and Port Wakefield in November which provided valuable technical experience to the instructors. The RRes will march into RTW in March and will peak with 120 RRes undergoing training in Apr 92. The signaller, operators and gun numbers will be in their units by early July. We do expect a reduction in IET once these courses have been conducted but there remains some scope for cross training.
- 7. 1991 saw no major changes to key personnel within Support Wing and during the period a number of manning deficiencies were rectified. The Wing conducted two successful Adventure Training exercises. TST conducted a cross country skiing exercise in the Kosciusko National Park and the Logistics Section conducted a Scuba Diving Course in the Nelsons Bay region. Renovations to the main barracks block are under way. Eventually, all but A & B wings will be single room accommodation. A & B wings will be re-modelled 4 bed rooms with an increased measure of privacy.
 - 8. Visitors to the School included ACPERS-A and the GOC TRG COMD. David Hay, then the local member, and Tim Moore, the State Minister for Environment and Local Planning came to talk to the staff about the workings and future of the Sewerage Treatment Plant. We hosted the RAA Corps Conference, the RAAChD Conference, RMC cadets on Exercise BARDIA, inter-service hockey teams, an American padre on holiday and a lady from Sydney University studying our own breed of bandicoots. And, finally, we provided the venue for the secret training camps of the Kangaroos, Wales, England the All Blacks, all of whom lost their first Test matches!
- 9. The efforts of certain staff members were rewarded this year with the presentation of a number of awards. CAPT Jenkins and WO2 Martin received GOC Commendations while BDR Fear and LCPL Perkins were awarded Soldier's Medallions. The unit hockey team did well to reach the Grand Final of the 2MD Competition and a unit team entering the interservice triathlon also performed well; particularly GNR Medlock who won the Under 21 Class. Our cricket team is currently leading the competition.
- 10. Finally, a word of thanks to the units that supported us throughout 1991. Support requirements seemed to change as often as the weather, yet the support was always there.

PROOF AND EXPERIMENTAL ESTABLISHMENT PORT WAKEFIELD

HERE'S PROOF!

- 1. 1991 has proven a challenging year for P&EE(PW). Almost 4000 rounds have been fired since our last report, including our 20 trials of various natures. In addition to the purely operational aspect of our work, we are tackling such things as DUP, ULMS, QA, TQM, UMR, DFMIS, CLAE, PMB, DRO, SSRP, FSRP, DRSR, DFSR, DPCU, Hhr, LZ ... and the new PR66 form.
- 2. The year commenced with considerable posting action, including the arrival of Major T.J. Gibbings as Officer Commanding. A total of 184 people visited the Range during the year, generally for trial or proof related reasons. Others included inspections by both the GOC and COFS Logistic Command, the Director of Artillery, hosting of the RAAMAN Conference, the Industrial Mobilisation Course and use of the Range area by other units and organisations.
- 3. A variety of proof tasks were conducted during the year, including Over water Recovery, 40mm Tracer, Range and Accuracy, 155mm, 105mm, 4.5in, 5in and 81mm Mortar. Ordnance proof of Hamel Guns continues at a steady rate, bringing the total to 88. Our wide and unusual variety of equipment was supplemented with the acceptance of a 76mm Oto Melara Proof Mount, for use in the proof of Navy 76mm ammunition components and barrels.
- 4. Trial activity was constant, addressing the performance of equipment, projectiles, fuses and propellants. In several cases the trials involved a series of related firings over a number of days, and considerable after-firing data acquisition activity. Of particular note were Naval 5in/54 Range Table Validation, further work for the Improved Mortar Project and a series of tasks for overseas customers. A 5in/54 Short Barrel Trial, still under way, necessitated valuable photographic support from the second best P&EE in Australia, unfortunately they were returned with relatively minor damage.
- 5. A comprehensive training program has been conducted throughout the year. This has included Unit Orientation Training, Offr/SNCO evening presentations and a Leadership Course for JNCO. At the time of writing, Range personnel are participating in an Adventure Training Exercise at Mount Dare Station in the far north of SA. In addition to practicing general military skills, significant assistance is being provided to the local National Parks and Wildlife Service.
- 6. Our new Instrumentation facility was opened earlier in the year, as was a Community Centre for use by Range staff and families.
- 7. A busy year has included major steps towards a more commercialised system of operation, and particularly towards Australian Standard (AS) 3902/ISO 9002. Each of these will assist us in achieving our primary aim; that of ensuring the provision of high quality weapon systems to the ADF.

R.A.A. ASSOCIATION (N.S.W.)

- 1. Coincident with the announcement of the results of the Force Structure Review, the Association had another hard look at itself in relation to the future and has made a firm commitment to remain in being for as long as the Royal Regiment of Australian Artillery remains in being and for some time beyond.
- 2. The theme of the Fifth Artillery Assembly on 10th August was "Supporting the Serving Gunner into the 21st Century". We believe that a major role of the Association in the future is to do exactly that by enhancing the hierarchy of awards available to serving gunners. In fact, since the Assembly, we have finalised the development of a new award. Development of further awards is a long term exercise requiring time and money. The Committee of the Association can find the time and is planning the finance.
- 3. At the same time we are not neglecting our traditional activities and make every effort to ensure that these maintain a high standard. The Gunner Dinner on 10th August was the best attended for many years with 180 nominations, 56% of which were received from serving gunners. We are grateful for that support and look forward to it continuing.
- 4. Finally, Committees are not immortal! As the last decade of the 20th Century takes its course serving and retired gunners of a younger generation must be prepared to come forward and take the reins.

KAPOOKA REPORT By Lieutenant D.W. Reid

- 1. At the beginning of 1990 I was informed by Corps that I would be posted to 1 RTB Kapooka in January 1991. My initial reaction was one of disappointment to say the least. After having spent only eighteen months at 8/12 Medium Regiment it was my intention to remain there and continue with my Regimental training. Senior officers who had had a posting at 1 RTB as a Platoon Commander expounded its virtues but did little to improve my opinion of the posting. However now, after having spent six months at 1 RTB, I realise that I will count this year as one of the best of my career.
- 2. 1 RTB provides the best posting opportunities to Junior Commanders, be they Corporals/Bombardiers or Lieutenants. For them, 1 RTB not only allows a break from the Regiment but also enhances skills that are used only occasionally in the battery. 1 RTB will also teach Junior Commanders new skills that will prove invaluable in future postings to the Regiment.
- 3. A Bombardier posted to 1 RTB will initially be employed as a Section Commander in Recruit Platoon. A Recruit Platoon consists of between three and five Section Commanders, a Platoon Sergeant and a Platoon Commander. As a Section Commander you will be in command of between 10 and 15 recruits. It is the Section Commanders responsibility to train their section in nearly all aspects of military life. Formal lesson responsibilities include Weapons training, Drill, Fieldcraft and Navigation.
- 4. A greater challenge than these formal lessons, for the section commander, is to be able to positively motivate these recruits to want to succeed. In the semi-informal environment of the lines only your example will instil in these young recruits the discipline and soldierly qualities required of a regular army soldier.
- 5. There are a couple of qualifications gained at 1 RTB that are harder to attain or be panelled for in the Regiments. Firstly, and most importantly for the young Bombardier, it is intended that all section commanders attend Subject One (SGT), of a two week duration, during their time at 1 RTB. The length of the course is made possible because as a section commander you are already doing much of the regular subject (SGT) in your day to day employment. The second course is the Small Arms Coaches Course which is compulsory and an excellent qualification to have.
- 6. As a Platoon Commander you will command, and it is a command position, a Recruit Platoon consisting of a Sergeant, three to five very capable and experienced Corporals, and between 36 and 50 recruits. Given a training programme it is your responsibility to ensure the smooth running of that programme. The platoon is within a company environment however you personally have very little contact with headquarters as you are expected to be able to react to the daily problems of recruit training yourself.

- 7. Platoon Commanders are responsible to the Chief Instructor for training results and the standard of the platoon as a whole. You are also responsible for a number of lessons including Navigation and Personal Administration. As a platoon commander you will also be involved in counselling and disciplining of recruits, recommending to the company commander recruits requiring retraining, and the personal administration of both staff and recruits.
- 8. 1 RTB provides Junior Commanders a unique opportunity to gain skills that cannot be gained anywhere else in the Army. As well as this it will enhance existing knowledge and abilities greatly. The hours worked are often long. However, there are often periods between platoons of a number of weeks of little work. During this period of time, there is often the opportunity to go on course or for adventure training. When the posting is looked at in its entirety, however, the most satisfying part is marching out a platoon of well trained, motivated soldiers when 13 weeks previously they were civilians.
